On a morning in September in the year 1943 a group of boys and girls gathered in Deer Creek High School to embark on a four year voyage to distant lands of strange and wondrous sights and experiences. They were Merlene Bachman, Charles Bennett, Bert Boling, James Booth, George Bruce, Neil Clark, Ruby Clay Northcutt, Boy Currier, Patty Gane, Lois Henrichs, Willa Mae Jamieson, Dorene Lichti, Don Lichti, Roy Wiley, Wayne Masters, Raymond Miller, Mary Ellen Meyer, Ivan Stratton, and Stratton, Robert Werneke, LeRoy Vannoy, Velma Williamson.

This voyage was to be a personally conducted tour in charge of Mr. Van Buskirk superintendent assisted by other faculty members. The tour included first a nine months stay in Freshman land. None in the tour had ever visited this land before but had reports of its fields and delicious foods from others travelers who had once sojourned there. 
